Presentation of Christ by Fr. Thomas Hopko

Forty days after Christ was born He was presented to God in the Jerusalem Temple according to the Mosaic Law. At this time as well His mother Mary underwent the ritual purification and offered the sacrifices as prescribed in the Law. Thus, forty days after Christmas, on the second of February, the Church celebrates the feast of the presentation called the Meeting (or Presentation or Reception) of the Lord.

The meeting of Christ by the elder Simeon and the prophetess Anna (Lk 2.22–36) is the main event of the feast of Christ's presentation in the Temple. It was "revealed to Simeon by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ" (Lk 2.26) and, inspired by the same Spirit, he came to the Temple where he met the new-born Messiah, took Him in his arms and said the words which are now chanted each evening at the end of the Orthodox Vespers service: (continued on page 2)

Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word; for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation which Thou hast prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for the revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to Thy people Israel (Lk 2.29–32).

In the service of the feast of the Meeting of the Lord, the fact emphasized is that Christ, the Son and Word of God through Whom the world was created, now is held as an infant in Simeon's hands; this same Son of God, the Giver of the Law, now Himself fulfills the Law, carried in arms as a human child.

Long-Term Planning: The Future of Our Parish for Generations to Come

One person gives freely, yet gains even more; another withholds unduly, but comes to poverty. A generous person will prosper; whoever refreshes others will be refreshed. (Proverbs 11:24-25)

I was baptized by Fr. Dan at St. George in 1998. I went on to serve as an altar boy for most of the early 2000s. I can still remember all the way back then in the Stone Ages when the entire congregation would park on the muddy front lawn. And it doesn't take much to remember when the men's room was just 1 stall in what is now a broom closet. Where will be in another 25 or 30 years? Long-term planning is focused on the future of our parish for generations to come.

We are blessed at St. George to have a wonderful home, one that we've been worshiping in for 50 years (in Upper Darby, at least!), in a building that is nearly 100 years old. Any homeowner knows, though, that to live in a home for 50+ years, you're going to deal with a lot of maintenance and improvements. The Long-Term Planning (LTP) Committee at St. George is dedicated to staying ahead of the changing dynamics of our parish life. We have been blessed with an expansive congregation in recent years under the leadership of Fr. Joel, and we are taking the challenges of expansion head-on.

So what does Long-Term Planning do? Simply put, our concern is with planning for longer term capital projects and improvements to the community that will make parish life as fruitful and fulfilling as possible. In 2016, LTP oversaw the expansion of our parking facilities; in 2019, the replacement of the church's roof. This past year, 2023, LTP oversaw a major bathroom renovation to benefit the growing number of young families and parishioners coming to liturgy each week. All of these projects were months or years in the making, based on feedback from parishioners and Parish Council, and budgeting for capital funds to make these improvements.

As many of you were here to see over the past ~15 years, our parish has, by the grace of God, grown from a small parish to the thriving community that we have today. And with this blessed prosperity, we must adapt to the growing needs of our community. For example, the 2024 LTP committee will be looking into expansions of our parking lot and Sunday School classrooms to accommodate our ever-increasing family in Christ. We also have our eyes set on improving St. George's handicap accessibility and upgrading our Great Hall to become more friendly and modern. We see all of these improvements as ways to improve our ability to serve the community at-large, grow our congregation, and, as I've said before, prepare our parish for generations to come.



St. George has been our home for over 100 years. Let's all do our best to make it our home for another 100!



Additional Option: Support a Family When You go Shopping


Buy the foods below and then that bag will be directly given to a family who comes to the pantry.




