Pentecost:

The Descent of the Holy Spirit

In the Old Testament Pentecost was the feast which occurred fifty days after Passover. As the passover feast celebrated the exodus of the Israelites from the slavery of Egypt, so Pentecost celebrated God's gift of the ten commandments to Moses on Mount Sinai.

In the new covenant of the Messiah, the passover event takes on its new meaning as the celebration of Christ's death and resurrection, the "exodus" of men from this sinful world to the Kingdom of God. And in the New Testament as well, the pentecostal feast is fulfilled and made new by the coming of the "new law," the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples of Christ.

The Holy Spirit that Christ had promised to his disciples came on the day of Pentecost (Jn 14.26, 15.26; Lk 24.49; Acts 1.5). The apostles received "the power from on high," and they began to preach and bear witness to Jesus as the risen Christ, the King and the Lord. This moment has traditionally been called the birthday of the Church.

Stewardship Notes

The Cornerstone on the right front entrance of our beloved St.George Church reads 1929. Its original name was St. John's and it was constructed by the Episcopal Archdiocese of Philadelphia. St. George Church roots began in Philadelphia in the 1920's on 11 th Street where a Lebanese priest performed the Liturgy out of his home for fellow Lebanese immigrants. The next functional St.George Church was founded in 1934 - or thereabouts at 10th and Federal St in Philadelphia according to our church historian Dr. Joseph Nasife. Incidentally, he may have been the first baby baptized at that church. That structure served the community until 1973 when "Stewards" of St George thought it was in the best interest of the faithful to move the church to its current site and purchased the former St John's Episcopal Church in Upper Darby which has been home since that time. While still a beautiful place of worship, our St. George Church is beginning to show its age as it approaches 100 years old.

Under the leadership of Father Joel and the Parish Council, significant improvements have been made to St. George over the past few years. The Church and our pastor's home have new roofs. Earlier this spring, 2 new HVAC systems were installed at 24,000 thousand dollars for our heating and cooling system. Work will soon commence on constructing a new women's restroom and renovation of the present woman's restroom into a men's restroom with a cost of of 30,000. These improvements have been budgeted for and paid out of our building fund. Much work however still lies ahead of us.

Under the direction of our recently appointed chairman, Joe Solomon Jr The Long Term Planning Committee is exploring practical and cost effective solutions to challenges including handicapped access to Church for our disabled and elderly parishioners and space for our growing number of Sunday School students which is both adequate and nurturing. After all, they are our future "Stewards." Additional projects warranting careful examination include new flooring for the great room, modernizing the kitchen, renovating the annex, and providing more parking for parishioners. All of these improvements require judicious planning, financial support and prayer. While we try to make improvements to our physical plant, we need to keep mindful of our larger mission to live the gospel and help our neighbors whether they may be such as our homeless neighbors in Philadelphia, refugees from war overseas or victims of natural disasters in Syria and Turkey.
